PREMIER CHAIRMAN MESSAGE

By this issue of the Premier Magazine, the topics of NCAA eligibility, Self Promotion and Showcasing the player's talent have all been presented. I am sure the player's who have taken the time to read the information and familiarized themselves with the material presented and then looked at the material referenced at least feels a little more informed on the steps needed to further their soccer ca-

reers. And, in reality, that is all CSL can hope for. After all, most of us at CSL are just administrators and it is easy to give advice. The hard part is convincing someone to take it. We can only hope. But from experience, we know any effort the player takes in following our advice will be rewarded.

I will take the time to provide you with just one example that I feel says it all. A few years ago, I was approached by the manager of a GU19 Premier team. Her team had participated in CSL Premier since U16 (at that time CSL only had U16, U17 and U19 age groups in Premier). She informed me that she began reading the Premier Magazines from the very 1st week her team was in Premier. She said she asked every player on her team to read every article and follow every instruction given. She even monitored her player's efforts and progress in following the areas of instruction that were outlined in the articles.

When she had finished explaining what the girls had done, she presented me with a wrapped gift. She asked me to open it which I eagerly did. The gift was an 8 by 10 framed picture of her ENTIRE team – all 18 girls. Each girl was wearing a sweatshirt. All 18 girls were wearing sweatshirts. Each girl had on a sweatshirt from the college they were going to attend in the Fall and play soccer for. All 18 girls received some form of scholarship from a college of their choice. It mattered not if it was D1, D2, D3 or NAIA. It was a college that the girl wanted to attend. A college of their own choice. Ms. Marshall simply said "It worked" and then she thanked us.

For a few years after that, we received dozens of these types of pictures. From both boy's and girl's teams. Recently, the tradition seems to have fallen by the wayside. Youth soccer has become less personal. There doesn't seem to be a common agenda anymore. Things seem to be more personal oriented than team oriented. But no matter, the end result will always be the same – "the Player that puts in the work – that player will reap the benefits." Of that I have no doubt.

Since this will be my last advice giving message for the 2014 season, I do want to cover one area that needs to be covered – and covered now.

Now is the time for the Player to concentrate on his or her game as any professional or future collegiate player should. The Player needs to play each game to the best of his or her ability. He or she needs to play each game



as a team player. The Player needs to act in the best interests of the team. The Player cannot afford to be taken out of his or her game by an opposing player, coach or referee. The Player should not let anyone distract him or her from their objective which is to play the game at their very best and contribute to their team's efforts.

The current Match reports this year show that players have forgotten their responsibilities to

not only themselves but to their team. They are letting referees get to them and are either losing focus due to their frustration or worse, getting red carded for their mouth. There is not a single college coach who wants a player on his or her team that cannot control their emotions. They want players who will be an asset to the team, not a liability. A player who receives red cards for losing control will not be on any coach's prospect list.

AND Parents – The game is for your children. It is their game. Your job is to come, watch and support your child and his/her teammates. When you get upset and lose control, you will affect your son or daughter. You will alter their concentration. You will cause them to lose focus. Also, please remember, I have been involved with Premier from its very inception and I have never, and I mean NEVER, seen a referee change any call because he or she has been badgered by a parent. On the contrary, the referees only become more wary of the parents and that is not a good thing.

This is my last informational message for the 2014 season. The next issue, the 5th in the Premier Magazine series, will be the last Premier Magazine for the season. The 5th Issue will celebrate the players and their 2014 Premier season in pictures. There will be team articles included in the issue but the Players themselves will be the highlight of the magazine. After all, the CSL Premier League was created for the players and it is only fitting we end the magazines this year by celebrating the players and their extraordinary love for the game. •

OPEN LETTER TO THE CSL BOARD OF DIRECTORS

OVERLY AGRESSIVE PLAY

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I am the parent of a CSL Premier GU15 player, writing to discuss an issue that I am sure you are all aware of. Week in and week out, young people are playing soccer at various levels throughout your organizations. Each and every one of them are giving their all, whatever that is in their young minds. They don't know what level others are playing at, only that they are giving their all for their team. This is a good thing, and teaches them valuable life lessons.

As parents and adults we have many responsibilities to these young people, encouraging, supporting, teaching them the ways of the world, defending them from dangers of all sorts. Part of our jobs is to keep each of these responsibilities in its proper priority. In the competitive environment of club soccer that can be difficult.

In the heat of competition, with 22 players covering over 50,000 square feet of area in pursuit of a rapidly bouncing ball, it is difficult to keep priorities in line. Players play their hardest in an effort to help their team win. They come in all shapes and sizes, some play with more aggression than others, some play with different intent. Everyone relies on the referee to even out those levels of aggression and intent. If the referee allows players with excess aggression and or the wrong intent to overpower other players, injuries occur, and the game of soccer is not being played. Soccer requires a balance of skill AND physicality, creating "the beautiful game" as it is often described. Winning through brutality has no place in soccer. Allowing this type of play to continue is counter to the goals of youth soccer and will damage youth soccer in the long run.

SAFETY OF THE PLAYERS MUST BE THE PRIMARY FOCUS.

I believe this focus is missing in our youth soccer organizations. Players are being allowed to play at whatever level of aggression and intent they possess. If other players get in the way, the thought seems to be that it is their own fault if they get hurt. This is wrong. These players do not know they are too aggressive until someone of authority tells them so by calling a foul or giving them a card. Referees are the authority on the field and if they allow this type of play, the players continue to play this way. And organizations with the wrong focus will continue to teach their players to play this way in the interest of winning.

Referees in those challenging environments are not immune to the heat of competition. But you, as administrators of your organizations are. It is your responsibility to assure referees know that safety is the primary focus and that they are the front line of safety for these young people. The primary goal for your organizations is not to win; it is to instill life lessons in these young people through the game of soccer. Insuring player safety is the responsibility of all of you and every coach and individual involved in these young people's development.

Please, for the good of youth soccer and everyone involved in it, make every effort to assure safety of the players is your primary focus.

Thank you, I welcome your thoughts and comments.

REPLY TO THE LETTER TO THE CSL BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Scott,

Thank you for your comments and expressing your concerns on the atmosphere surrounding the conduct in which our games are played and the manner in which they are officiated. Your concerns have been our concerns for a significant period of time. The conduct you have described in your letter is not limited to CSL games, but is systemic in all sports today; youth, college, adult and professional. And the environment surrounding the game has a substantial impact on the course of any game whether it is an amateur or professional game.

You have specifically identified areas of concern that you feel need attention in order to improve, not only the quality of the game, but the safety of the players. And those concerns are exactly what CSL has been addressing for the last few years, but not in the manner you expect.

CSL is a gaming circuit only. CSL does not have any of its own teams that it is responsible to train, manage or coach. Its members are teams that are under the jurisdiction and control of individual clubs. Clubs that have been sanctioned for league play by Cal South. CSL has no vested interest in any team "winning". CSL has virtually no authority over any of its participating clubs in their training and development of its players.

So – how can CSL help? Let's start with the Overly Aggressive Play issue. CSL has developed an online scoring system that records individual player penalty points (Red and Yellow cards) as well as cumulative team penalty points.

Every card issued a player/coach/administrator/parent by a referee is entered into the system. Team penalty points are updated instantly and CSL is notified if a team reaches a certain penalty point threshold and is then contacted by CSL about its conduct. Sanctions are imposed on each team when it reaches 20 accumulated points, 30 accumulated points and then team is disbanded if it reaches 40 accumulated points.

Any player or coach who receives a Red Card is suspended from play for a minimum of 2 games in addition to the game in which he/she received the Red Card. If a player or coach receives a 2nd Red Card, then the party will be suspended for 4 more additional games. Should a player or coach be given Red Card or Sent Off for Violent Conduct, they can be immediately suspended until such time as a hearing is held by CSL to determine if the player or coach shall be suspended for the remainder of the season or for a longer period of time.

All of the above remedies do have a "Chilling" affect on Overly Aggressive Play. But is it enough?

CSL believes that in order to truly affect change in today's sport culture, the environment in which the game is played must be changed. A better experience needs to be created for the game. CSL does believe that a fun, safe soccer season is a basic expectation of every family that commits their child to play soccer.

But this environment cannot be mandated by USSF, USYS, Cal South or CSL. The change must start within the teams themselves. The team must set the example. A team's favorable experience throughout a season will spread throughout the club and soon the entire club will be striving for a better soccer experience.

In order to accomplish this better soccer experience, CSL and XARA have created a program, NO VICTORY WITHOUT HONOR (NVWH). The goal of this program is to have a team commit to certain "Standards for Success". If these standards are met, not only will the team have a better soccer experience, the team will be rewarded for reaching its goals. It is CSL's belief that participation in the NVWH program will create a ground swell that will have a positive effect and change the current atmosphere surrounding the game today. In fact, it already has. You can find these "Standards for Success" and more information on the NVWH program in the CSL Handbook.

The NVWH program is not a mandatory program, participation is a decision made by each team coach/manager. CSL would encourage you to ensure that your team is involved in the program; this will offer your family and the others involved with your team the best platform upon which you can create a better soccer experience and make the environment in which the game is played both positive and safe.

Regarding your comments regarding the creation of a safe playing environment, CSL has been actively engaged in this effort for a long time. We have supported this effort with initiatives such as the distribution of First Aid kits to all teams in the league and the use of the Xara Soccer Safe program. The Soccer Safe Program will

be launched league wide in 2015 and was created to support the creation of a safe soccer environment. The NVWH and Soccer Safe programs will together be a reminder to all players, parents, coaches and administrators that soccer is a more enjoyable experience for everyone when the game is played in a positive, safe environment.

As to the referees' role in the game, there is no doubt that he or she plays a critical part in creating the competitive atmosphere surrounding the game. But let's be clear, the players, coach and spectators also affect the attitude of the referee. But a good referee should be able to set the tone, shed any negative elements from the players and sidelines and officiate with professionalism. That is what is expected of every referee. But sometimes that is not what happens.

CSL has no input into the training of a referee. The training, qualifying and licensing of a referee is in the sole jurisdiction of Cal South. CSL is mandated to use only Cal South Certified Referee Associations and Cal South licensed referees. Cal South and George Noujaim, the Cal South State Referee Chairman, do a very good job in recruiting and training referees. But they can do only so much. They are not on the fields every day and cannot monitor all 7,000 referees as to each referee's consistent game capability.

CSL has instituted a program to assist in evaluating a referee's on the field performance. On each match report generated by the CSL Online System is the Center Referee's name and an email address for that referee's assignor. A return email from the assignor is required to be sent to the team coach or manager and comments are reviewed periodically by CSL personnel and evaluated as to whether or not a pattern is present and requires action by CSL.

While the above procedures assist in monitoring current referee's job performance, they do not address the issue of creating the better environment that is needed now

In order to address this issue, this year CSL has created a NVWH Program for referees. The "Standards for Success" differ from that of teams but have the same desired result: to improve the quality of the game and the experience realized by the players and spectators.

The referee's "Standards for Success" involve continuing referee courses, instruction, monitoring, assessments and physical conditioning. Once the "Standards for Success" have been met, assignments for higher level competitive games will be available to the referee. CSL acknowledges that the results will not be widely seen for a few more years, but changes will occur and the environment surrounding the game will greatly improve.

CSL is making every effort to not only insure the safety of every player but also to create a soccer safe environment so everyone may have a better soccer experience.

SANTA BARBARA SOCCER CLUB

anta Barbara Soccer Club's ("SBSC") Boys Under-17 was originally formed at the U-9 age level. By the time the boys were U-11's the team had incorporated a few other players and from that point forward that group of boys have served as the core of the team. The team really enjoys playing together and has a special bond as a group – the boys spend a lot of time together on and off the field.

Drawing from his own experience as a professional player, head coach Rudy Ybarra, had a very clear vision and idea of what philosophy he wanted to teach this group of boys. For Rudy it was clear that he wanted to teach this group of boys how to play "Total Football" and mimic the Dutch renowned international coach, Rinus Michels, that once guided him as a player when he played for the Los Angeles Aztecs in the North American Soccer League in the late 1970's.

Rinus guided the national team of Holland with players like Johan Cryuff to two consecutive World Cup finals (West Germany 1974 and Argentina 1978). Many soccer experts consider Rinus to be the father of modern soccer because it was those national teams of Holland that showed the world how to play Total Football in which all players attack and all players defend. The Dutch Orange Machine of the 1970's also showed the world good quick possession with constant movement off the ball in order to give options to each other.


So since the age of U-9, Rudy began to over emphasize the importance of good technical skill along with quality reception and distribution of the ball. One of Rudy's goals was to create an environment that constantly challenged the boys physically, mentally and





technically; so that they would become more comfortable on the ball so that the team could have a possession oriented attack. The other piece of the puzzle for Rudy was to make sure that the boys made good soccer decisions and so small sided tactical games and transitional possession games were introduced to the boys. In order to develop their soccer IQ, Rudy was

constantly putting the boys in situations which they had to diagnose quickly and then a make decision on. Rudy understood that he had to develop the soccer IQ of each individual as well as the team as a collective unit. In



order to be a good team, Rudy believes that "players must make good decisions on and off the ball". This led to many exercises and possession games becoming repetitive at training sessions so that the boys were constantly put in the same situations over and over again so that in time the decision making process would become much easier and quicker.

This group of players has played in every possible major competition in the state of California and in the country. The boys headed into this year's National Championship as current back-to-back champions and were looking to three-peat but unfortunately were eliminated in the semifinals. In the last five years, the boys have gone on to win the Cal South National Cup and the US Youth Soccer Region IV Championship on four separate occasions. Another accomplishment that the boys were able to achieve was winning the California Regional League in its inaugural season (2013-2014).

The team is excited about returning to Coast Soccer League this season as they are looking forward to playing in the most competitive league in the country. The group is focused and they are on a mission to regain their title as national champions. ①


GREATER LONG BEACH FURY


to play other positions. Even with these last minute changes, they have been able to adjust and continue to play as a team to finish the job.

Despite the injuries and new adjustments, the girls have managed to keep a positive attitude and have stayed focused on their game. The girls are looking forward to another competitive season! ①













